<u>Maths</u>

This week we have converted fractions into decimals and percentages.

1-Convert fractions into decimals

To change a fraction to a decimal, you divide the top number by the bottom number (divide the numerator by the denominator).

$$\frac{3}{4} = 0.75$$

2- Convert decimals into fractions

To change a decimal to a fraction: multiply the decimal by 100 in this case 0.85X100. The answer becomes the numerator (top number)
Divide that number by 100. This will give you a

large fraction (in this case $\frac{300}{100}$). That fraction needs to be simplified. Here both numbers are divisible by 5. Keep dividing by 5 until you arrive at the last possible prime number (you can't divide by 5 anymore). For example:

$$0.85 = \frac{85}{100} = \frac{17}{20}$$

3-Converting between percentages and fractions or decimals

To write a percentage as a fraction or decimal: divide by 100 For example

$$64\% = 64 \div 100 = 0.64$$
 or $64\% = \frac{64}{100} = \frac{16}{25}$
To write a decimal or fraction as a %: multiply by

For example
$$0.125 = 0.125 \times 100 = 12.5\%$$
 or $\frac{2}{5} \times 100 = 40\%$ (i.e. $\frac{2}{5}$ of 100%)= $100 \div 2 \times 5 = 40$
