


<u>Year 6 Homework</u> <u>4-11-22</u>

This week's homework in Maths is a worksheet to revise our learning about long division, some grammar questions and spellings.

<u>English</u>

This week, we have understood the features of a diary entry. A diary entry is an account in which the writer explains what has happened to them.

Here's a checklist of the key features to use when a diary entry is written.

- Start with 'Dear Diary'.
- Describe the places where the events happened.
- Write in the past tense.
- Use pronouns like I, my and me to show that the events happened to you.
- Talk about how you were feeling or what you were thinking when each event happened.
- Use rhetorical questions.

We wrote three diary entries from the perspective of Romeo, Juliet and Tybalt. Romeo, a Montague, and Juliet, a Capulet, met at a party at the Capulet's house and they fell in love. Romeo shouldn't have been there and Juliet's cousin Tybalt saw him and decided to get revenge for the insult.
