<u>English</u>

for this week in line with our phonics lessons; they are on Purple Mash and photocopied onto the back of this sheet.


Mystery Reader

Easter Gardens

Once again, St Peter and St Paul's Church are inviting the children to create an Easter Garden at home. Similar to the Nativity scene at Christmas, an Easter Garden is the recreation of Christ's tomb. An Easter garden has three essential features: a mound with at least one cross to represent Calvary; a stone or stone structure to suggest the empty tomb; and lots of live greenery and flowers. Easter Gardens should be brought into school on Monday 31st March. The Faith Team and a member of the clergy will judge the entries on Tuesday 1st April. The Easter Gardens will then be displayed in the Southwark room where there will be an opportunity for each class to visit the hall to look at the different entries. The winning entry will be announced in Collective Worship on Wednesday 2nd April. We welcome individual entries or joint entries with siblings or friends! The gardens will be taken over to St Peter and St Paul's Church on Thursday 3rd April where they will be on display over the Easter period. <u>Lent Appeal</u>

Week' Love Project last term. A representative from the charity Love Works came to collect all the donations on Wednesday and was overwhelmed with the generosity of our families. This year, as part of our Spring term Love Project, we are supporting the Southwark Diocese Lent Appeal. The Bishop's Lent Call for 2025 is raising funds for projects that help children and young people recover from trauma and which encourage their mental wellbeing. It is supporting this type of work in the Diocese of Jerusalem and the Middle East, the Link Dioceses in Zimbabwe and our own diocese. To raise money for the Lent Appeal we are asking children to raise money through either giving something up or taking something up for the 40 days of Lent. We are encouraging children to collect sponsorship money for each day they manage this. Sponsorship forms will be going home with the children on Friday 28th February. Lent begins on Wednesday 5th March and ends on Thursday 17th April. Children will need to bring in their sponsorship money the first week back of the Summer term.
