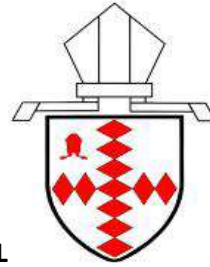

4. Put a note in a Talk Time Box. There is one outside Year 1.

Roles and Responsibilities

Our Headteacher, Mrs Farray-Green and our Anti Bullying Leader, Mrs Cordey have overall responsibility for the policy and making sure these things happen. They work with the governors, our parents/carers, the local authority (Surrey LA) and other people who help keep schools safe and improve schools.

Mrs Farray-Green and Mrs Cordey are responsible for: -

- Managing bullying incidents
- Managing the reporting and recording of bullying incidents
- Ensuring that we have time to re-read our policy to check we are still doing what it says and to make any changes if we need to
- The Teachers and Teaching Assistants know everything that's happening too so they can make sure no one is bullying here

We have Mrs Vorster, our Vice Chair of Governors who is a member of our Anti-Bullying Partnership and is invited to attend all of our Partnership meetings.

Two representatives from each year group are also elected annually to create the Anti-Bullying team supporting Mrs Cordey.

What is Bullying?

'Behaviour by an individual or group usually repeated over time, that intentionally hurts another individual or group either physically or emotionally'.

Safe to Learn: embedding anti bullying work in schools (2007)

How is bullying different from teasing/falling out between friends or being mean?

- The behaviour is deliberate
- It keeps on happening even after you've said 'no' or told an adult about it

We think bullying someone because they are different in any way is wrong. We are a Church of England Primary School and want everyone to be welcomed in this school. Our Peace Makers' Charter has a line in it that says: 'At Nutfield Church we are all different and we like it that way'. This sentence is very important in our school, see page 6.

On the lookout

The Anti-Bullying Team and Pupil Parliament are on the lookout around our school for any types of behaviour which may lead to bullying.

There are different types of Bullying:

Physical bullying includes hitting, kicking, tripping, pinching and pushing or damaging property

Verbal bullying may happen when a person or group are seen to be different in some way and includes name-calling, insults, teasing, intimidation or verbal abuse, homophobic, transgender or racist remarks (including a focus on religious or cultural difference), comments about a special educational need or disability.

Social bullying can be carried out behind a person's back. It includes:

- lying and spreading rumours
- negative facial or physical gestures, menacing or unkind looks
- playing nasty jokes to embarrass and humiliate
- mimicking unkindly
- encouraging others to socially exclude someone
- damaging someone's social reputation or social acceptance
- excluding people from groups

Cyber bullying is the use of information and communication technology, particularly mobile phones and the internet, deliberately to upset someone else. It includes:

- abusive or hurtful texts emails or posts, images or videos
- deliberately excluding others online
- saying or spreading nasty gossip or rumours online
- imitating others online or using their log-in

Reporting Bullying

If you or a friend are being bullied, there are lots of things you can do. We suggest you tell your class teacher or another adult you trust. You can also speak to our Headteacher, Mrs Farray-Green, or our Anti-Bullying Leader, Mrs Cordey.

Mrs Farray-Green and Mrs Cordey want everyone to be safe and have made it clear to all teachers and pupils that this is a no-bullying school.

The Anti-Bullying Partnership children have designed a flowchart to explain what happens when an incident of bullying is reported. Please see page 2.
